CROP INSURANCE CLOSING DATE

"With the closing date for crop insurance under the Agricultural Adjustment Program set for November 30th, it will be necessary for prospective applicants to act quickly if they are to protect their 1939 income through this method," says Walter A. Holt, county agent.

Nearly a quarter million farmers in the United States have applied for crop insurance and the largest wheat land operator in Umatilla county is among the large list of applications in this county. Those in close touch with the crop insurance program observe that where a farmer investigates the opportunities under this insurance plan program, the result is that they take advantage of the opportunity to protect their next year's income. Persons so concerned may make application at the office of the Agricultural Conservation Association on the second floor of the post office building in Pendleton.

DALLES PREPARES BIG WELCOME FOR E.O. WHEAT LEAGUE

THE DALLES—Harry L. Brown, assistant secretary of agriculture, from Washington, D. C., Governor-elect Charles A. Sprague, and Senator-elect Rufus Holman will be featured speakers on the program of the Eastern Oregon Wheat League here December 2 and 3, according to the program issued by officers of the league.

The coming of these state and national leaders, added to the previous list of important program events, makes certain, in the opinion of local committee members, that the convention here will be the largest in the eleven year history of the league.

Brown is coming direct from Washington, D. C., to appear on the program, where he will discuss the relationship of the Pacific northwest wheat industry to the national wheat program. He will be heard Saturday forenoon and will also confer with committees in charge of drawing up reports on the national farm program. Sprague will be the principal banquet speaker Friday evening, while Holman is scheduled to speak on Saturday.

The Dalles business men have joined hands with Wasco county farmers in preparing an outstanding welcome and program of entertainment for the hundreds of wheat farmers expected at the convention. Leading business houses are preparing elaborate window displays emphasizing the wheat industry. An early morning excursion boat trip around the harbor and docks has been arranged to explain the facilities being developed for joint rail, water and truck transportation. A comedy pageant featuring the building of the Bonneville dam is being prepared as an entertainment feature at the banquet.

Members of the committee in charge of local arrangements here are Harold Sexton, sheriff; Emil Schano, vice president of the wheat league; W. W. Lawrence, county agent; W. S. Nelson, secretary of The Dalles Chamber of Commerce; Charles Harth, William Ragsdale, Harry Ragsdale and L. Wernmark.

COOPERATIVE LEAGUE AND NATIONAL COOPERATIVES TAKE STEPS TOWARD COORDINATION

(Co-op League News Service) CHICAGO—A national economic union of all regional consumers' cooperatives loomed large on the horizon today following consecutive meetings here of the national boards of directors of National Cooperatives, Inc., and the Cooperative League of the U.S.A., November 9, 10 and 11.

The directors of the two national organizations accepted in principle a policy of coordination looking toward uniting all regional consumers' cooperative purchasing associations in the United States and set up machinery to work out the initial steps involved.

Official action leading toward unification was taken in Indianapolis in December, 1935, when the constitution committee of the Cooperative League recommended to the board of directors that a committee be appointed to "undertake the task of uniting all the regional consumers' cooperative purchasing associations in the United States into a single cohesive national organiza-

tion." Following this formal recognition of the fact that two separately incorporated national organizations had been created when National Cooperatives was legally incorporated in 1933, a Joint Coordinating Committee of the Cooperative League and National Cooperatives and later the two executive committees have had the subject under consideration since that time.

In pursuance of the action of the League Board and the deliberations of the Joint Committees, the general secretary of the Cooperative League, E. R. Bowen, presented to the board of directors at their meeting on November 11, a general report covering the "Functions, Plan and Program of a National Consumers' Cooperative Organization", which, after lengthy consideration, was adopted in principle by the board.

The directors of National Cooperatives, meeting the two preceding days, had also discussed and taken steps toward the same general conclusion.

As practical steps in carrying out coordination, the board of directors of the Cooperative League (1) voted to open an office in Chicago and accepted the invitation of National Cooperatives to maintain joint offices; (2) voted to put into effect, as of January 1, a dues basis of 5c per individual member per year in order to finance broader publicity, education, legislation and other functions as outlined; and (3) voted to extend invitations along with similar invitations from National Cooperatives, to a number of additional regional cooperatives which have already indicated their desire to go along on a united national program.

The executive committees of the League and National Cooperatives will meet in Chicago, December 9, to consider the site of joint offices, personnel and applications for membership. The board of the league further decided to meet once every three months to coincide with the quarterly meetings of the board of National Cooperatives.

A. F. OF L. OUTLINES PROGRAM TO MEET NEW ECONOMIC CRISIS

(Co-op League News Service) WASHINGTON, D. C.—The Monthly Survey of Business of the American Federation of Labor for November, 1938, declares "American industry is today coming to grips with a problem which has never been faced squarely. The new industrial revolution which took place with the coming of electric power and highly productive machinery has, without our realizing it, shaken the very foundations of our economic order.

"The captains of industry created mass production, but they could not build up a mass market able to absorb the production of high powered industrial plants", the A. F. of L. survey points out. This situation has led to the creation of idle factories, idle men and idle money which automatically create starvation incomes for the masses of American workmen.

Pointing out that government regulation, while correcting some of the minor evils, is not an answer to our problem, the A. F. of L. bulletin outlines the following program:

"There is no panacea that will solve it. There are a number of steps which will bring us nearer the goal. We have already embarked on the first step: Trade union organization throughout industry and a steady and rapid increase in wages.

"Secondly, we need to think of ourselves as consumers. The consumer is the key man of the power age. His buying power is the gold mine out of which resources for industrial growth must come. Eight out of every ten consumers derive their buying power from wages or small salaries. Therefore the trade union has a responsibility as spokesman for more than three-quarters of all consumers. As consumers, however, our concern is not only for income, but also for the lowest possible price and the best quality in the goods we buy. Consumers' cooperation are already performing an essential function in controlling quality and price for farmers and for some trade union members. Their growth is the second measure for increasing buying power."

"Neither of these two measures alone, however, can in the near future break the jam which prevents the free flow of production and consumption," the A. F. of L. Monthly Survey of Business continues. To do this it proposes a commission composed of representatives of owners, management and labor concerned in

production and distribution, consumers, and government representatives, and served by technicians to work out methods of planned production and mass distribution.

BALLARD LISTS FACTORS IN GOOD EXTENSION WORK

Successful administration of extension work within a state seeks the furtherance of a well coordinated program in the interests of the farm population, rather than the mere attainment of high sounding statistical goals, F. L. Ballard, vice-director in charge of extension in Oregon, told the National Association of Land-Grant colleges in, one of the principal speeches delivered at the recent convention in Chicago.

The invitation to Ballard to speak on "What Constitutes Effective Extension Administration Within a State," was generally recognized as a high compliment to the type of administration used in Oregon.

Ballard pointed out that any extension service must guard against the repetition of established and once successful activities to the point "where such walls of self-esteem are built up that the entire process is in a rut." He said that the first requirement in effectiveness is to recognize the necessity of periodic change.

In summing up, Ballard pointed out that three chief factors contribute to effective administration. These are first, the extension service well established as the leading agency in assisting to develop and carry out a sound agricultural program. Second, a coordinated, well-trained personnel, with adequate compensation and recognized professional standing. Third, making the most of opportunities for maintaining sound and fair off-campus relationships which will be reflected in financial support and growth in proportion to the success achieved.

OSC Leader Gets National Honor.

CHICAGO—F. L. Ballard, vice-director of extension in Oregon, was one of 13 extension workers in the entire United States to be awarded regional certificates of recognition for outstanding work in the extension service. The awards were made at the annual meeting of the National Association of Land Grant colleges by Epsilon Sigma Phi, national honorary extension fraternity. Ballard has been with the Oregon extension service since 1917 and has been vice-director in charge of administration since 1934.

NATIONAL COOPERATIVES SETS UP CORPORATION TO PROTECT CO-OP LABEL

(Co-op League News Service) CHICAGO—National Cooperatives, a federation of regional consumers cooperative purchasing associations, took action here November 9 and 10 to set up a subsidiary corporation to further protect the CO-OP trade name which is owned by members of National Cooperatives. During the last year several large private profit business organizations have featured the word CO-OP in their national advertising attempting to take advantage of the great interest in the cooperative movement.

A. J. Hayes, general manager of Central Cooperative Wholesale, Superior, Wisconsin, was elected to the board to succeed H. V. Nurm, deceased and J. F. Shea, vice president of Midland Cooperative Wholesale, Minneapolis, was elected to fill the unexpired term of the late Frank Osborne.

The board approved recommendations to the annual meeting to be held in February, 1939, covering an increase in the number of directors in anticipation of an increase of membership of several regional cooperative associations which have expressed their desire to affiliate. The number of members of the executive committee was enlarged from three to seven to facilitate the handling of business between quarterly board meetings.

Many Moisture Tests Made.

THE DALLES—Continuing compilation of data carried on during the past five years in cooperation with the Moro Experiment station on dry land projects, 320 moisture tests were taken during October by County Agent W. Wray Lawrence. Tests were made in nine orchards in three communities, with the idea of determining the moisture content in the soils in orchards of different ages and handled under different cultivation conditions.
