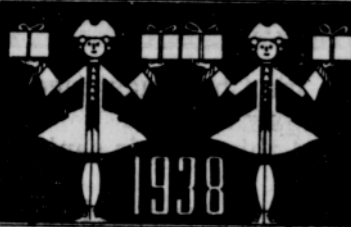

**POULTRY RANKS
FIFTH IN PRODUCING
FARM INCOME**

The poultry industry in Oregon
ranks fifth in cash farm incomes
among larger agricultural commodi-
ties in the state, according to facts
compiled by the Oregon State col-
lege extension service for use in con-
nection with the World Poultry Con-
gress in Cleveland in 1939.

In 1937 the cash income from
chickens and eggs was \$5,191,000,
and from market turkeys \$3,753,000.
The two constitute 7.2 per cent of
the cash farm income of Oregon for
that year. This does not include
sales of breeding stock, hatching
eggs, day-old chicks or poults.

**TAX TECHNICIAN
SAILS FOR U. S.
TO GATHER DATA**

CHICAGO—Louise C. Silva, tax
expert and Deputy Tax Commission-
er for the Territory of Hawaii, is
coming to the United States to aid
the Townsend Plan, Dr. Francis E.
Townsend, founder of the Move-
ment, announced this week.

Mr. Silva will prepare technical
and statistical data on the Town-
send Plan bill for presentation to
the forthcoming session of Con-
gress.

Prepared Hawaiian Law

William Borthwick, Hawaiian
Tax Commissioner, has credited Mr.
Silva with the technical work on the
important Hawaiian tax law which
was modeled after the Townsend
Plan tax proposal. A strong Town-
send proponent himself, Mr. Borth-
wick recently called his deputy the
foremost expert in the world on this
form of taxation.

Mr. Silva was granted a year's
leave of absence from his govern-
ment post to assist the Townsend
organization. He was to have left
Hawaii, December 9, aboard the liner
Matsonia. He is expected to arrive
in Chicago about December 16.

Persuaded by Founder

Although Mr. Silva had expressed
a great desire to make a detailed
study of the total business volume
in the United States, and to assist
in drafting the new Townsend mea-
sure, he decided to come here only
after a month of persuasion by Dr.
Townsend.

"We are most fortunate in ob-
taining the services of Mr. Silva at
this time," Dr. Townsend said, "His
great ability and his technical
knowledge will mean a great deal to
us. We must have the statistical
and technical knowledge to support
our assertions, and Mr. Silva will be
able to supply that for us."

Dr. Townsend said Mr. Silva would
appear before any committees of the
House when his services were de-
manded.

Death must not repeat its harvest
of 11 lives on Oregon's highways
during the Christmas holiday this
year.

The Yuletide week end last year
was this state's worst holiday peri-
od in three years from the stand-
point of traffic fatalities, Secretary
of State Earl Snell said today.

"Winter throws a host of pitfalls
in the path of the motorist, but safe,
sensible automobile operation can
overcome them," he declared. "One
must drive slowly in fog, in rain or
upon icy pavement; one must obey
the rules of the road, unflinchingly;
one must keep his automobile in
good condition; one must not drive
when he is fatigued or otherwise
unfit to take the wheel."
