**COOPERATION AT CHRISTMAS**

Christmas is an ancient festival. It celebrates the end of the winter decline of the sun in its orbit and the beginning of the sun's movement toward its zenith. No longer does the life-giving orb sink lower each day and the days grow shorter. The advancement of darkness stops and light becomes again the master of the day.

As ancient people watched the sinking sun, they awaited with anxiety the end of the decline. And every year it came, and brought hope. Nature never played them false. They knew the day would come and they celebrated it as a blessed festival.

There are certain laws which govern the affairs of the universe. They are known and dependable. The laws of gravity and the laws of moving bodies that hold the planets in their courses are among these eternal verities.

There are laws governing society—the conduct of men. And among these are the laws of cooperation. The laws of gravity were discovered and formulated by Newton. The laws of cooperation were discovered and formulated by the Rochdale Pioneers who started their laboratory experiment to prove these laws at the time of the winter solstice in 1844.

But like the laws of gravity, the laws of cooperation had existed through the ages. Nobody made them. They are eternal. Disaster follows violation of the laws of gravity. Disaster follows violation of cooperative law.

A man best gets what he needs for life when he unites with his fellow men and helps them and when they in turn do the same for him, rather than when man contends against man. This is an ancient and fundamental law.

Cooperation is a movement to put man's affairs in harmony with this law. Those who violate it must suffer the consequences. The distress, the poverty, the cries of pain across the world today come from the futile attempts to violate this natural law of cooperation. Man will destroy himself unless he recognizes this law and ceases its violation. Cooperation is a law of life.

This is the lesson for man to learn at this Christmas season as he beholds the orderly and ceaseless resurrection of the seasons in the perpetual progress of time.

**WHAT TO SERVE THE DAYS BETWEEN**

At this time you have your Christmas dinner plans well in hand and are on a tear to put them into execution. Some one has said that the planning of Christmas menus is like trimming the tree, you bring out your choice and favorite recipes and hang them on the prominent branches of your menus. And so it is, for every homemaker chooses the dishes that she knows will add the sparkle to the holiday feast, long anticipated by her brood.

But the Christmas dinner is usually just the beginning of a week of festivity. This is the season that just does something to you and makes you seek out old friends, old neighbors, the almost-forgotten relative. Indeed, it is the season of happy hearts and those who make the most of it are the very ones who reap the most enjoyment.


Your home-for-the holidays member of the family will appreciate the festivities that require the least time in preparation. If you budget your time for household tasks and food preparation you will have the time for the many things you long to do during these days between. Have in mind dishes that are quickly put together, dishes that can be prepared ahead of time without loss of looks or flavor. Molded salads, hot cream soups, pressed chicken or veal and pork molds, quick hot breads with a favorite preserve, home canned fruits as dessert and a well-filled cookie jar are all time-saving and yet filling and appetizing too.

One of our favorites which can be used for luncheon, dinner or a fire-side supper is oyster stew and this is our recipe for it.

**Oyster Stew.**

2 tablespoons butter  
 Large pinch paprika  
 Dash of tabasco sauce  
 Dash of Worcestershire sauce  
 Salt and pepper to taste  
 1 pint oysters  
 2 cups cream  
 2 cups rich milk  
 Put butter, paprika, tabasco, Worcestershire, salt, pepper and oysters in top of double boiler. Heat over boiling water until edges of oysters begin to curl. Then add milk and cream. When it is piping hot, ladle into warm soup bowls into which you have put a portion of butter. Serve at once, with salted oyster crackers.
