CANNERYMEN WILL MEET FOR COURSE

The eighteenth annual canners' and fieldmen's school conducted by the food industries department at Oregon State college will be held this year from February 6 to 18, inclusive, announces E. H. Wiegand, head of the department.

Alton Sisson, manager of the Co-operative Laundry & Cannery of Hermiston, and Earl Watson, who

will assist him this summer, will leave early Monday morning to attend the conference and take the course. They have been authorized by the board of directors to attend the school.

The detailed program leaflet just issued shows that a more comprehensive school for commercial canners will be put on than ever before, with eight other governmental departments and commercial companies cooperating. The work is divided up so as to provide suitable instruction for beginners in the cannery business as well as those who have had long experience in the industry.

Divisions of the work will include a three-day course for cannery fieldmen, a double-seaming course on handling canning machines, a fruit and vegetable canning course, work on the grading of canned foods, methods of handling frozen fruits and vegetables, and technical laboratory work on food examination and quality control.

Oregon Makes Poultry Show Goal. CORVALLIS—Oregon is one of four states which have reached its goal in support of the seventh Worlds Poultry congress and exposition, to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, July 28 to August 7. Oregon, Washington, New Hampshire and New Jersey are the only four states which are listed as having gone over the top with 100 per cent achievement, according to the word received from national headquarters by Noel Bennion, extension poultryman at Oregon State college and secretary of the state committee.

have made serious inroads in the butter market. The dairy industry must choose between lowering its price to recapture the market from other forms of fat or spend comparable sums to tell its story of quality and food value."

Production Statistics.
H. K. Dean of the experiment station gave statistics on butterfat production as found from records compiled at the station during the 305 day lactation period. The feed formula used during this time was 400 pounds mill run, 200 pounds ground barley and 100 pounds ground oats.

Mr. Dean stated that production cost is determined by the relative price of butterfat per pound, and the cost of hay and grain. The experiments were carried on by feeding hay alone to one group of cows, and feeding hay and grain to another group. In the hay alone group each cow produced 26.6 lbs. butterfat and consumed 29 lbs. of hay per day. The cow fed hay and grain produced 32.2 lbs. butterfat and consumed 26.9 lbs. of hay and 4.5 lbs. grain. The hay alone group consumed 36.7 lbs. hay to produce a pound of butterfat, and the hay and grain group consumed 27.9 lbs. hay and 4.6 lbs. grain to produce a pound of butterfat.

Mr. Dean stated that the margin over feed cost received for butterfat in 1937 was 27 cents, based upon hay at \$8 a ton and grain at \$25 a ton. The return per cow over feed cost was \$20.61, figured for 365 days. In order to make grain feeding more profitable than feeding hay alone, Mr. Dean stated, the returns must exceed 24.78 cents per pound of butterfat.

The information given by Mr. Dean will be contained in a bulletin issued by the Oregon Experiment Station within the next six months.

Succulent Feeding.
Don Sherwood, herdsman at the station, gave figures on experiments in feeding squash and artichokes in addition to hay and grain feeding, over a three months period, some of that time ranging cows on sweet clover pasture.

The combination reduced the amount of hay required to produce a pound of butterfat to 22.4 lbs. on hay alone, and to 16.8 lbs. hay and 4.18 lbs. grain, on hay and grain.

The group fed hay alone and succulents produced 300 lbs. butterfat, and the group fed hay, grain and succulents produced 372 lbs. butterfat, which is an increase of 12.8 percent for the first group, and 15.5 percent for the second group, over previous years without succulent feeding, Mr. Sherwood said.

How Horse Trots
The trot is a progressive motion of a quadruped, as a horse, in which each diagonal pair of legs is alternately lifted, thrust forward and placed upon the ground with approximate synchrony, the body of the animal being entirely unsupported twice during each stride. When a horse is trotting at a high rate of speed, the forefoot usually precedes its diagonal hind foot in being lifted from and placed upon the ground, and the body is entirely without support for about one-half of the total length of the stride.

How Curfew Originated
The word curfew is taken from the French words, "couver feu," and describes the obligation which was placed upon all citizens to cover with ashes or to bank any fire which they might have in their houses at a certain time of the day when the curfew bell was rung. This was soon after sundown and was a measure of fire prevention.
