### GARDEN CLUB CHATS

Members of the club and guests listened to a fine talk by Earl Benseal at the regular meeting Monday afternoon. He spoke on shrubs suited to this locality, their needs and their pruning. The talk proved very interesting.

Benseal received his technical information at a 12 weeks course at the state college in Corvallis. He announced that he would prune shrubs at a local residence the next day, and invited all interested to come and he would answer questions as he worked.

A constitution and by-laws for the club were read and accepted.

A tentative list of subjects for further meetings throughout the year was read by Mrs. W. L. Hamm of the program committee, and approved by the members. When completed it will be printed and distributed to members.

There have been requests for more gardening material in this column. While we know very little on this subject, except as the late Will Rogers would say, "What I read in the papers," we are willing to look through publications to find things that may be of interest to you. There are four ready to help and glad for any constructive suggestions. The source of information will always be given.

The Kunderd gladiolus nursery in the middle west is one of the best known in the country. They say, "Any good garden soil is suitable although they like a sandy loam best. In preparing the soil follow only such methods as you would give a fine crop of garden vegetables. However, you will be rewarded for any special care given them in the way of cultivating, fertilizing and watering. Gladioli enjoy sunshine. Plant in rows, beds, borders, among shrubbery, roses, or in separate groups. Plant any time after early garden making, followed by successive plantings at ten day intervals. The very finest blooms come from the earliest and latest plantings.

"Know your roots and you will know better how to treat the plants that grow on them. Rhizomes of the tall bearded iris lie on top of the soil, because it likes being baked by the sun and that baking has something to do with the production of robust leaves and flowers. On the other hand, fibrous roots of the Siberian iris indicate their desire for a damp location."

Find a tree with a deep tap root and what does it tell? That it will withstand wind. That it wants a spot where the soil can be easily penetrated to a great depth. That the plant will often grow in dry soil because its roots can go down to where there is moisture." — House and Garden Year Book for 1939.
