Alfalfa Fears Death, Sets Seed.

The "instinct" of a plant to reproduce itself before it dies has been utilized in developing a method of inducing alfalfa to set seed under irrigated conditions on the Harney branch experiment station at Burns. By a combination of cultivation, competition with an interplanted grain crop, and timing of irrigations to leave a dry period during the hot summer, good yields of seed have been obtained. A thin stand of alfalfa is used to start with.
