

ed by preventing the plants from maturing seeds over a period of years, equal to the length of time their seeds will remain alive in the soil. Chemical spray with sodium chloride is recommended for small patches and out of the way places. Three to seven pounds to a square rod is necessary.

The flaring or spreading type of shovel, frequently called the duck foot, Mr. Zivney said, is best for most perennial noxious weeds. For quack grass, use a spring tooth harrow.

Weed consciousness must be aroused in a community or on the part of the individual, Mr. Zivney said, before there can be effective control and eradication. Voluntary cooperative effort will accomplish far greater results than compulsory means and will not require a heavy tax burden, Mr. Zivney said.
