## IRISH FLOURISH IN DREAM PICTURED BY OPERETTA

### PRESENTS SHOW JUNIOR HI CAST

The junior high school, under the direction of Mrs. Greaves, Miss Bradley and Mr. Burrell, presented the two act operetta, "Days O'Kerry Dancing," Friday evening, March 24. A matinee was given on Thursday afternoon, March 23.

Mrs. Greaves expressed her appreciation to H. A. Pnkow, who made the donkey used in the operetta.

The operetta centers around Granny and Patrick O'Malley, who, with a houseful of young guests, are celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of their coming to America from Ireland.

The old people sit in rocking chairs in which they alternately doze and awaken. While fairies dart in and out, Nora, the granddaughter, raptly listens to Granny's tales of her childhood days in Ireland. The young guests are singing and playing in a garden outside.

Nora reminds the old people that the hour is late and they go off to bed.

In act two, it is fifty years earlier in County Kerry, Ireland. Pat (Patrick in act one) is a boy living with his mother, Rose O'Malley. Eileen O'Malley (Granny in act one) is Rose's adopted daughter, her parents having died when she was an infant.

The County Fair is to take place the next day and the excitement is high for Pat is to race his donkey against Dinny Sheeley's. Dinny plots with a wicked Witch and, in order to win the race, steals Pat's red cap which is a protection against the fairies. Pat is whisked away by the fairies, carried out onto the ocean, caught up into the heavens, and made a Star Child.

Eileen weeps over the Wishing Well, longing for Pat's return. Her pleas are heard by the Golden Flying-Fish, who assures her that since she has wept "tears o'lovin' kindness" her wish will be granted. Pat is returned, but being a Star Child, is in a daze. His cap is recovered from the Witch and when it is placed on his head, he awakens and rushes off to the Fair.

As he leaves, the Emerald Fairy arises from the Wishing Well and tells the people that she has been under the Giant's spell in the guise of a Witch, but being washed in the waters of the Well, the spell is broken. The Golden Prince is also delivered from his spell. Pat rushes in victorious, carrying the harp he has won, and leading his donkey. Dinny has been badly beaten and has run away. The Prince and Princess invite the populace to the castle for a festival. Pat strikes up his harp, and they all join in a happy song for their good fortune and the love of Ireland.

The Hermiston Commercial club held its regular dinner meeting Tuesday night in the Hermiston Hotel dining room with E. P. Dodd, president, presiding.

A resolution adopted at the meeting by the 20 members present read as follows:

"Be it Resolved, That the Hermiston Commercial club go on record as opposed to granting a franchise to any power commission at this time, because of prospects for cheaper power." The secretary was instructed to place the resolution on record and give copies to the local newspaper, the city recorder, and the city council.

Other business taken care of at the meeting was a change in clean-up day, which has been advanced to Friday, April 14. George Harkenrider, Curtis Simons and Sam Moore were appointed on a committee to arrange for captains for the various districts. The spring clean-up is an annual affair and anyone having old tin cans or rubbish of any kind may have it hauled away on this day free of charge if the debris is sacked or boxed. Trucks will pick up the rubbish in alleys where it is placed at an accessible point.
