"JESSE JAMES" IS TECHNICOLOR EPIC

The most romantic outlaw in the history of America, the desperado whose daring colored a whole era and endowed it with the title of the "Serious Seventies"—the man who invented bank holdups and introduced train robberies—has been brought to the screen at last in "Jesse James," the Technicolor epic, starring Tyrone Power, Henry Fonda, Nancy Kelly and Randolph Scott, which starts at the Oasis theatre Sunday.

It shows how Jesse James and his equally notorious brother, Frank (Henry Fonda), began their career of crime as a direct result of the murder of their mother by an unscrupulous hireling of the St. Louis Midland railroad, in the person of one Barshee, played by Brian Donlevy.

Jesse shoots Barshee and swears to avenge his mother's death. A murderer with an ever-increasing price on his head, he goes from raid to raid.

Love comes to Jesse in the person of Zerelda, better known as Zee, played by Nancy Kelly, a gently nurtured girl who gave up a life of ease to share the wild, reckless life of this hunted outlaw as his wife, and to bear his son alone in the hills.

The story depicts in thrilling terms the most colorful exploits of the man who invented train robberies and bank holdups, and does not neglect his romance with the lovely girl who sacrificed a life of comfort to share his wild and reckless life.

TURKEY OUTLOOK FOR 1939 SEASON SEEMS PROMISING

Turkey production in Oregon, as well as throughout the United States, is expected to continue upward in 1939 and yet turkey growers may have a reasonably favorable season when net returns are calculated. This is the conclusion reached in the annual turkey outlook contained in the current Agricultural Situation and Outlook issued by the O.S.C. extension service and dealing with turkeys, potatoes, horses and mules and current farm price trends. Copies may be obtained free from any extension office.

The expected continuation of a stronger demand for turkeys and the prospect of continued low feed prices are favorable factors in the turkey outlook. The government's survey of producers' intentions, released in mid-March, indicates a 27 per cent increase in the turkey crop this year compared with last. A year ago the government predicted a 6 per cent increase which was not quite reached by actual production

in 1938. Unfavorable factors are increases in competing meats, larger cold storage stocks of turkeys and larger breeding flocks to be marketed after the laying season is over. Cash income from Oregon's turkey crop in 1938 was estimated at nearly four million dollars, making turkeys one of the state's most important specialty crops, the report shows. Oregon now ranks about fifth among the states in turkey production and has an output twice as great as in 1929 when the last general census was taken.

Potato acreage is expected to decrease in 1939, which, with other factors, makes the potato situation appear more favorable than at the beginning of 1938.

The national farm price index was down two points more as of February 15 and is five points below a year ago. Chief factors in the lower index compared with last year are the grain index off 23 points and dairy products down 14. Fruit and meat animals are up ten and six points, respectively, compared with 1938.
