NOTED AUTHORITY SPEAKS ON RADIUM

Dr. Luther S. H. Gable, one of the country's foremost authorities on radium, spoke Friday afternoon, March 17, at the high school. Dr. Gable explained in an under-

standable manner many of the uses of the rare element, which is valued at \$25,000 per gram. Four-hundred tons of rock is refined to produce one thirty-second of an ounce, which will lose half of its energy in 1680 years. There are in the world, but three pounds of the precious element, that radiates powerful heat and light rays.

Radium is used as a powerful agent in radio, agriculture and medicine; in small quantities stimulating life, but in larger quantities causing death. As radium will burn human tissue and heal it again, it is used to cure malignant tumors and in the future will prove to be of great value to humanity.

Dr. Gable says that the greatest improvements thus far have been made entirely by accident. He expects that those in the future years will be made by some young, "Thomas Edison," perhaps someone in the high school audience to which he was talking.
