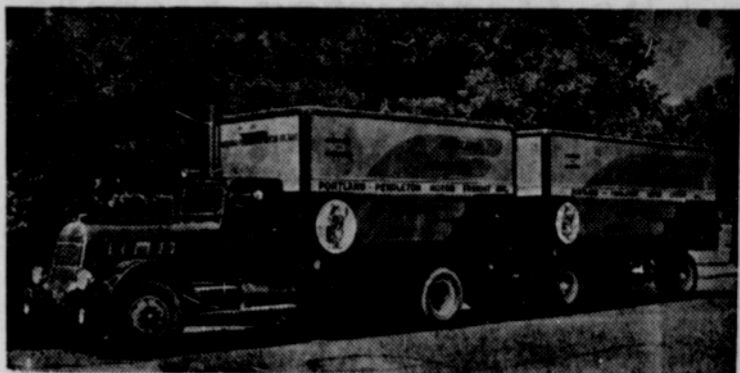
Miss Freda Fredrickson came home from Portland last week. She

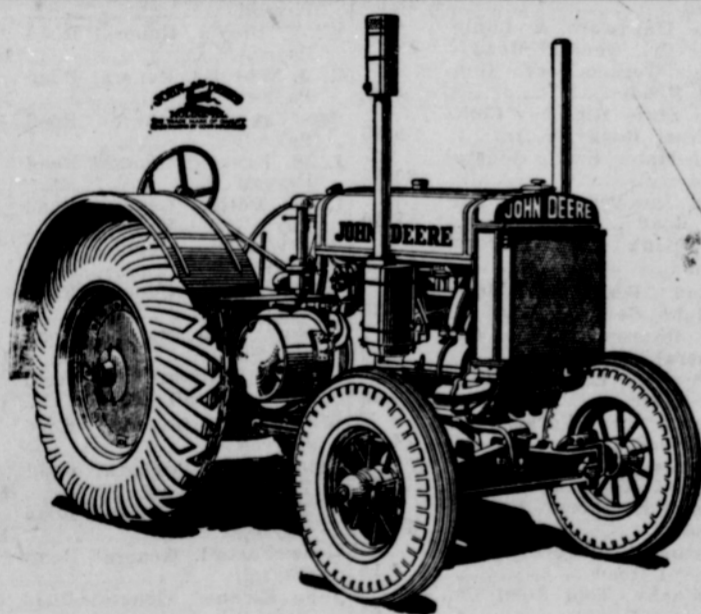
