CO-OPS TAKE DIRECT ACTION TO CHECK RAPID RISE OF PRICE OF LEAD ARSENATE

(Co-op League News Service) Ithaca, N. Y.—The story of how the co-ops took direct economic action to check the unwarranted hiking of prices of lead arsenate, the basic material used in fruit sprays, is told very simply in the current issue of The Patron, published by the Cooperative Grange League Federation Exchange, which has its chemical headquarters here and serves 120,000 farm families in New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

In the spring of 1938, fruit growers in New York state faced disaster because of the ruinous prices received for the 1937 crops and the rapidly advancing price of farm supplies. To make matters still worse, the price of lead arsenate shot up, although investigation showed that the price of pig lead used in the manufacture of lead arsenate had declined. The increase was due solely to larger margins asked by manufacturers and distributors. GLF protested vigorously against the unwarranted hiking of prices but the demand fell on deaf ears.

Fruit grower-members of GLF needed and demanded help in the situation. They held a protest meeting, called in representatives of their cooperative and demanded that their co-op do something about it. GLF did.

To meet the emergency the cooperative deviated temporarily from its policy of meeting market prices and declared an advance patronage dividend of 2c per pound on all lead arsenate handled during the 1938 spray season. The result was a lower price to the farm-consumer. This was made possible by knocking out the "velvet" provided for wholesale and retail distributors in the general price rise and by averaging costs on a substantial carry-over of lead arsenate which was purchased in 1937 at a lower price. Both the central organization and the local co-op agencies cut handling margins. The result was a lower net cost of lead arsenate to cooperative members at the time they needed relief most and a powerful object lesson to manufacturers who had attempted to make profits out of economic disaster without reckoning on farmers who were organized to protect themselves by cooperative purchasing.

NEW STATE EGG GRADES WILL HELP THE HOUSEWIFE

Salem—No longer will the busy housewife be hopelessly perplexed by technical trade terms which tell the quality of eggs she is buying. Those days are gone forever under the provisions of the new Oregon egg law passed by the last legislature and enforced by the state department of agriculture.

Under the new law, the housewife has merely to recall the alphabet. The present egg grade terms are "Grade AA", "Grade A" and "Grade B"—this in the order of the quality. These now take the place of the old terms used in retail trade which were Specials, Extras and Standard.

The housewife wants to know the weight of the eggs she is buying as well as the quality in order to get the most for her money. The state department of agriculture says that the size designations have been expanded. These now include "undersize" and "oversize" in addition to "large", "medium" and "small" designations. The "oversize" designation applies to all eggs weighing more than the "large". Correspondingly, "undersize" includes eggs weighing less than the "small."

COOKING FROZEN FOODS EXPLAINED AT LOCKER MEET

Proper cooking, in addition to proper storage methods, is vital in obtaining maximum satisfaction from the rapidly growing locker storage movement, delegates to the Northwest Frozen Foods Locker association conference were told at their second annual conference held at O.S.C. late in April.

Ordinary methods of cooking vegetables are not always the best for frozen foods, according to Mildred Boggs, foods research specialist of Washington State college. Standard meat cookery is more applicable to both fresh and frozen meat, the delegates were told by Agnes M. Kolshorn of the foods and nutrition department at O.S.C.

Miss Boggs, who has been conducting extensive research in frozen vegetable cookery in cooperation with the United States department of agriculture frozen foods laboratories at Seattle, recommends steam or so-called waterless cooking for most frozen vegetables. As short a cooking time as possible is best to conserve food values and flavor, although, where it is important to retain exceptionally good green color, short boiling may be used though at the sacrifice of some flavor.

Frozen vegetables, with the exception of corn on the cob and spinach which freezes into hard blocks, retain more nutritive qualities if cooked immediately and allowed to thaw on the stove. It is particularly important to steam corn on the cob rather than boil it, she said, in order to prevent its becoming water-soaked.

By coordinating research in freezing processes and methods of cooking the best practices are being determined for the production of bet-

ter quality of frozen foods both in nutritive value and flavor, the conference learned.

C. C. Condit of Forest Grove was elected president of the tri-state organization; W. B. McCracken of Mt. Vernon, Wn., vice president; and Thomas Onsdorf of the O.S.C. food products department, secretary-treasurer. A legislative committee was also set up, the Oregon members of which are L. M. Ramage, Salem, and E. W. Boley, Lebanon. The 1940 conference will be held in Seattle.

REA EXAMINER REPORTS FAVORABLY

George Lewis of the examining division of the National REA, with headquarters in Washington, and whose territory covers 11 western states, spent Monday and Tuesday in Hermiston making examination of the proposed extension in the wheat district. He traveled along the proposed system and discussed the matter with a number of farmers in Stage and Despain gulches as to their proposed uses of electricity and as to the feasibility of the extension. Before he left here he informed the members of the district board that he would make a favorable report recommending the construction of the new line.

The board of directors of the Umatilla Electric Cooperative held a meeting Tuesday evening to consult with Mr. Ritzman, a representative of the Bonneville administration relative to the future use of Bonneville power for the rural lines. The board was assured of the possibilities for bringing Bonneville power to this section and will make formal application for power.

Approval of the contract to build the 32 miles extension is expected any day from Washington.
