The Miller gardens there are the largest peony gardens west of the Rockies, and one of three or four largest in the world. With these nationally-known displays so close at hand no one should miss visiting them for both pleasure and profit.

Be sure to go to the flower show in the Legion hall next Monday. While our meaning may not be quite clear, we suggest that you take a friend in the afternoon and your husband in the evening! TURKEY PLANT TO BE READY FOR OPERATION MAY 12

 waste material cannot get out of the room and will greatly aid the sanitary conditions. The plant is rated as the most modern in eastern Oregon.

A unique feature of the building is the installation of a vaporation condenser which cares for the refrigeration of the two lockers. The machine is manufactured by the Worthington Pump & Machinery Co. and is expected to reduce the cost of refrigeration to a minimum. The locker rooms will be automatically controlled and will be kept at 33 degrees. A fir-tex drip pan arrangement is being installed in the locker rooms to aid in the circulation.

The association has purchased 25 dollies on which to hang dressed birds. Each dolly will hold 1,600 pounds. New coops are being built by the association and will be available for shippers. A truck will be sent out on the road to pick up the turkeys. A schedule will be worked out so that each shipper will know when to have his birds ready for delivery.

The whole building is well lighted and modern in every respect. A corrugated iron roof covers the entire floor space. Alterations and changes may be made at a later date as new needs arise.

There will be space available on May 12 for 50 pickers and two killers.
