**ELECTRICAL DEMONSTRATION SHOWS WORTH TO USERS**

Houtchens was ably assisted in the demonstration by Miss Marie Kennison and Miss Helene Pierson of Hermiston.

During the demonstration Miss Houtchens also explained and demonstrated the use of other electric equipment in the kitchen, such as refrigerator, electric mixer, electric roaster and the hot plate.

Pressure water system on the farm by the use of a shallow water pump and a deep well pump were demonstrated by Everett H. Davis, extension specialist of Oregon State college. By actual test on the stage of the auditorium he showed that water by electricity was pumped at the rate of 1 cent per hour, and compared it with the old fashioned pump whereby anyone had to pump for an hour for the same result. The av-

erage cost to the farmer using electricity for pumping water is about 75c per month, he stated. He also mentioned the overhead sprinkling system and of its probability of successful use in this area, and told of the use of lights in poultry houses and brooder houses, thereby increasing production.

Miss Frances Clinton, home demonstration agent, compared the difference in hand ironers, ranging from \$3 to \$9. She suggested the ladies choose the iron best suited for the work required. A light iron, probably more expensive, was best suited for a lot of fine ironing, while the heavier one would be better for heavy materials. She gave the cost of the use of the iron in a home as 30c per month for the average family. The use of a washing machine in home was given as 25c per month for the average family. She also warned the farmers not to sign pieces of papers to try out some equipment and later find that it is a contract for purchase.
