WARNERS TELL OF TRIP TO SAN FRANCISCO FAIR

ed in all directions creating a beautiful artistic effect. Flowers of every description are grouped throughout the ground and around fountains and some are of the very rarest type.

They visited with Mrs. E. P. Dodd in the Oregon display and stated that the Oregon exhibit contains several interesting features. Especially so is an animated picture of the Oregon coast about 7x12 feet in which ocean spray is seen and waves rolling. It is lighted and creates a beautiful scene.

There are many individual buildings on the grounds and a fair visitor has every type of entertainment to choose from. A large theatre, California, is noted for its high class stage shows. Cavalcade, an outside performance, is a portrayal of the history of the west—coming of the railroads, Indians, soldiers, cowboys and old trains. A well arranged spray of water is used instead of a curtain. Various shades of light are played on the spray to give different effects.

The Fine Arts building contains some of the old master paintings of Italy and other foreign countries. They are heavily guarded and are very rare. Many contemporary paintings are also shown.

Mr. Warner stated that the best way to get acquainted at the exposition is to take one of the numerous trains running through the grounds. A guide explains the different loca-

tions and gives the passengers a definite picture of the whole fair. The parking space is well arranged but he stated that one has to be careful to keep a parking slip because it is very easy to lose one's automobile among the thousands parked there daily. Admission to the fair is 55c and 50c parking charge. Another 50c is paid in crossing the bridge to the fairgrounds.

All the talk that the fair is not yet finished is "bunk", according to Mr. Warner. He noticed only one building that was still under construction.

The Warners saw television demonstrated and declared that a screen was used above a regular sized radio on which they could see the performers.

An interesting feature is the telephone building where it is possible to talk to anyone in the United States free of charge providing one is lucky enough to be among the winners.

A loud speaking system is arranged about the entire grounds and some type of music and entertainment is going on all the time.

Mr. Warner attended a banquet for Amos Alonzo Stagg, famous coach now at the College of Pacific, held in San Francisco. Stagg is now 77 years of age and was presented a gold football. Mr. Warner also saw Joe DiMaggio's Italian Grotto, and visited the Stanford campus where he watched Clyde Jeffreys, star sprinter, work out, and the Stanford football team at spring practice.

The weather was delightful all the time but Mr. Warner stated that warm coats were necessary practically all the time on the island particularly at night. They covered approximately 2000 miles on the trip without mishap.
