"Low railroad fares and special rates on busses for the 'Oregon Days' will be a contributing factor to bolster the Oregon attendance for these days on Treasure Island."

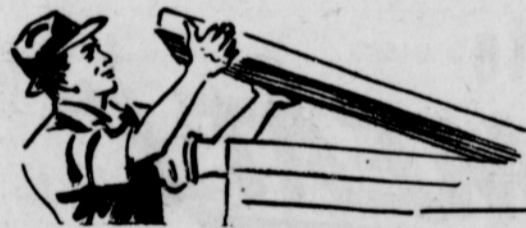

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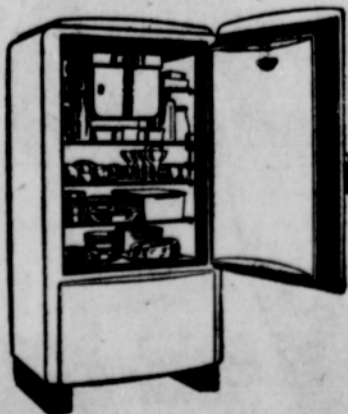
