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GARDEN CLUB CHATS

The meeting Monday was well attended and very interesting. Mrs. T. A. O'Grady, ably assisted by Mrs. F. B. Belt, told the highlights of the state convention of Garden clubs, which they attended in May at Forest Grove. Busy from early morning, when they attended banquets at which some of the finest gardeners of the Northwest gave interesting and instructive talks, the delegates brought back to the local club a fine report of garden activities all over the state, and many new plans for the growth of our organization.

Talks and demonstrations at the convention will provide material for study during the year and contacts

with other clubs will prove beneficial to club members here.

There are 82 garden clubs in the state. An idea of the growth of this group will be obtained from the fact that in 1938 there were only 29 clubs in the state federation. Such interest in the beautification of homes throughout the state can only result in the upbuilding of the physical advantages of the state, finer communities and increased property values.

Lectures on flower arrangement and judging, value of birds in the garden, work of junior clubs, and talks by delegates from other clubs on outstanding accomplishments were painstakingly noted by the speakers and faithfully reported. Mrs. O'Grady gave a demonstration before the club of how to make a corsage bouquet and the materials used. Facts gleaned at the conven-

tion were so many that new ideas will be brought forth at later meetings throughout the club year.

In order to have books of the local club conform to those of the state federation, to facilitate up-to-the-minute data in the state year book, the club was asked by the state president to hold election of officers in May or June. To conform to this request and as a mark of appreciation of the work of the present officers, they were unanimously re-elected, to hold office until July 1, 1940.

Decorations of flowers on the officers' table at the meeting were furnished by Mrs. Alice Wagner, roses in a cream colored container, and a bouquet of anemones in a black bowl by Mrs. Julius Gimble. Members are invited to bring flowers for decoration to the meetings at any time.

The Fraser & Son seed company sent envelopes of giant zinnia seed to be distributed to each member of the club, to be planted for contest in the fall. The seed company will furnish plant and ribbon awards and furnish scoring points for judges. There is plenty of time for the zinnias to mature and if you are a club member and have not received your seed, call on Mrs. McReynolds.

Next week we will have full details of a regional garden club picnic to be held at Echo on June 21. Plan to attend this, and get and give tips to your fellow gardeners, besides having a good social time.

A paper by Mrs. Dean was read by Mrs. Alice Wagner. Among other things to do in the garden in June were noted: divide iris, stake dahlias, use pyrethrum spray for (or against) ants, prune and shape shrubs, pinch back chrysanthemums and plant perennial seeds for next year's garden.

A hint from a convention delegate on how to preserve cut flowers was to use one-half a Morcrop tablet to one quart of water.

Mrs. B. A. Doyle gave a report on the work of the committee who put on the recent successful flower show. She expressed appreciation of the cooperation given the workers by club members and others.
