A graduate of the University of Oregon where he studied sociology as well as law, Finsley was regarded by the board as the man best suited for the job out of the 42 who applied for the appointment.

GOVERNOR SPRAGUE SPEAKS TO GROUP

Picking poultry team winners for trips to the world congress in Cleveland and listening to noted personalities including Governor Charles A. Sprague, were among the many highlights added to regular class work and recreation at the silver anniversary 4-H club summer session at Oregon State college.

This twenty-fifth session again broke all records for attendance with 758 boys, 1217 girls and 115 leaders making a total attendance of 2090. The record number previously was 1690 boys and girls here last year.

Governor Sprague, who has had intimate contact with club work through his former public school experience, praised the organization for providing wholesome work for youngsters during the ages when they are properly protected from regular employment by child labor laws.
