Much of the material for this book was gleaned from an interview of Willard Herren, son of William Herren. The latter was 20 years of age when he suffered the hardships he describes. John Herren, his father, was captain of one of the trains that followed Stephen Meek across the unmarked desert of Central Oregon. He later settled near Salem and became an influential citizen of the state.

Mrs. DeMoss has obtained material from many sources for her book and has probably combined them for as authentic record as has been written. A slight thread of fiction with several fictitious characters has been added for the sake of continuity but the narratives disclosed are all authentic facts.

The author has spent 21 years of her life as a teacher in the Oregon schools. In her teachings she felt a need for supplementary books for her students which would be both interesting and authentic enough to be instructive. This thought was the inspiration of "Blue Bucket Nuggets."

She is truly a garden club booster and her intense interest has not stopped with the report from the state garden club convention; but rather has been supplemented by materials discovered in library books on the subject. 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
