"UNION PACIFIC" STARTS SUNDAY

From the historic moment when Abraham Lincoln signed the bill creating the "Union Pacific" to the never-to-be-forgotten occasion at Promontory Point, Utah, when a golden spike hammered into a rail symbolized the realization of a great dream, "Union Pacific," Cecil B. DeMille's newest production, tells the impressive story of the conquest of a wilderness and the linking of a vast continent with bands of steel, starring Barbara Stanwyck and Joel McCrea, which starts Sunday at the Oasis theatre, the Paramount film combines the great events in the road's history with a human story of two young lovers caught up in the whirlwind and carried along with it. Typical of the thousands who risked their fortunes and their lives to turn a dream into a reality, Mollie Monahan and Jeff Butler (Miss Stanwyck and McCrea) fight against Eastern money manipulators, frontier sharpers, the perils of a wilderness and the attacks of Indian nations manning their last stand. Others figuring importantly in an all-star cast are Akim Tamiroff, who brings order to the frontier at the end of a bull-whip, Lynne Overman, Robert Preston and Brian Donlevy.

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Because pies invariably contain much fat and sugar they are in the class of energy foods. This time of year berry pies are our special weakness but berry pies were never intended to sit like prim models for hours without drooping. They are supposed to be juicy, so go easy on the flour. The less time that elapses after they are out of the oven the more compliments you will get. This holds true, of course, with any fruit pie, and if you have tried fresh berry pie with cream, heavy or whipped, you know why it

can become an almost incurable habit. Even if you are peering daily at the scales, don't rob yourself of the pleasure of an occasional berry or fresh fruit pie.

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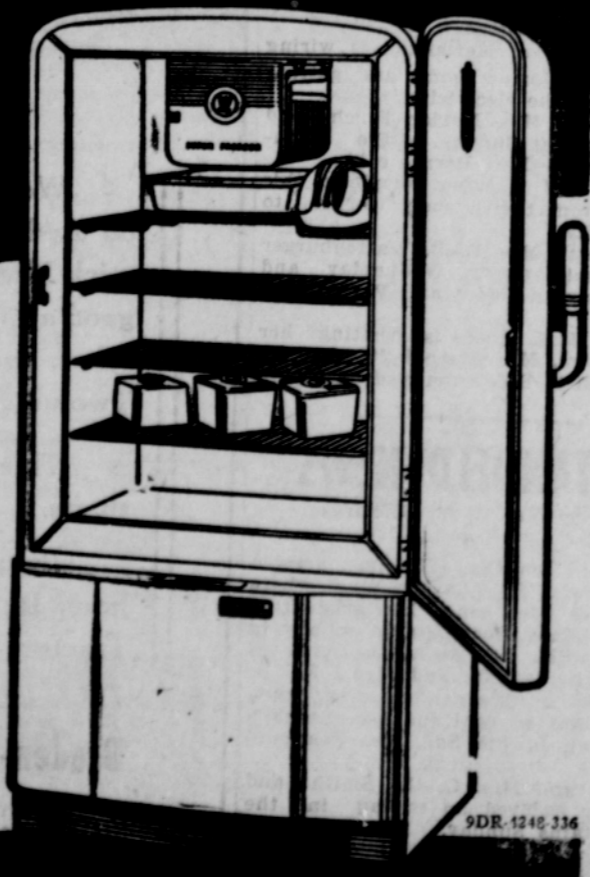
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
