1 1/2 tbsp. granulated gelatin 1 1/4 cups orange juice
2 tbsp. lemon juice 2 tbsp. salt
1/4 cup cold water 1/2 cup Carnation Milk

Soften gelatin in cold water. Add sugar and orange juice and heat over hot water until gelatin dissolves. Remove from heat and add lemon juice and salt.
