sprays for flowering plants most generally accepted, and gave instructions for cutting and selecting rose and gladiolas for exhibition.

Miss Marilla Dunning, a teacher in the Stockton, Cal., schools, as an introduction to her review of "Flowers on Treasure Island," showed large pictures of the fair in color and said the motive for this International Exposition is two-fold, first "Peace", having cooperation in placing elaborate exhibits from countries surrounding the Pacific ocean, and secondly, the celebration in the attainment of those two magnificent bridges.

Not only is Treasure Island a man-made island, but with a great amount of effort and patience, the topmost six feet of soil had to be literally washed to free it from the excessive salt accumulation, and then certain chemicals applied, so that the soil might be conditioned ready for flowering plants, shrubs, trees and lawns. Some 4000 trees on the island are "borrowed" and must be returned to respective owners at the close of the fair. She named Magnolia, Willow, Aacia, Oak, Eucalyptus and Laurel, as the trees most in evidence. At blossom time potted Flowering Almond, Peach and Orange trees were used in the decoration scheme.

Miss Dunning said although one never sees a gardener at work during the daily fair hours, 10:00 a. m. to 10:00 p. m. during the night and early morning hours, crews must be busy, for never is seen a wilted plant, old flowers, untrimmed grass, etc. Flowering plants are arranged according to their flowering period, color harmony and adaptability in the picture. There is never a lull, or a garden without blossoms.

In April the tulips were especially imposing. Thousands of bulbs were furnished by Holland growers. Other spring flowers noted because of their color accent were Azalias, Iris, Cala Lillies, Violas, Stock and Pansies. In Miss Dunning's second visit in July, she reported the Wild Lilac, Marguerites, Daisies, Calendula, Zinnias, Geraniums, Rhododendron and Delphinium were lovely. Soon the Bird of Paradise and Chrysanthemums will bring flower interest. Miss Dunning expects to have more week end visits to the fair this fall, in order to gain even a deeper appreciation of the finer arts displayed at this fair, which one may never chance to see again, for so many precious exhibits are furnished from other lands. Miss Dunning said no amount of praise would seem sufficient to relate the worth and beauty of the night lighting effects.

In order to have for the club members' reference, the titles and call numbers of the bulletins Mrs. Dean mentioned, her August paper was ordered placed on file. She named bulletin 385, "Diseases of Flowering Plants," as the newest one of its kind, recently published by the New Jersey Experiment station. Another one, circular No. 388, "House Plant Care and Control of Insects Bothering Them," will be helpful to many Hermiston house plant enthusiasts.

Mrs. Thomas O'Grady brought a splendid example of "Dish Gardening." This will be on display in the Hermiston Herald window this week. There will be a division for dish gardening exhibits in the Fall Flower show, so better get acquainted with the idea. New books in the library are available on the subject.


The afternoon and evening sessions, 2:30 and 7:30 respectively, for the one day flower school, sponsored by the club, employing the services of Mrs. Daniel Haefner, Portland, will be held in the basement of the Methodist church Tuesday, August 15. The afternoon session will feature "Flower Arrangement" and the evening session "Flower Judging." The public is invited and it is hoped that the many Hermiston men who have proven themselves able gardeners will be present. A small charge of 15c will be asked at each session to help defray accredited speaker, so fine in her field. Members are asked to furnish flowers and containers, and some antiques please.

Monday, August 21, there will be a special meeting of the Garden Club to make plans for entering exhibits at the county fair, August 28, 29 and 30, to have the float committee submit its plan and request cooperation, and Mrs. Vera Doyle will want to hear a report of each committee chairman for Fall Flower show, September 8, and make sure enthusiasm is contagious and spreading fast.

Copies of the rules and divisions will be found in the Hermiston Drug store early next week. Also there will be an entry sheet for those who plan to exhibit to sign. This is very important, so that proper spacing can be provided for display in each division. Anyone may exhibit. This is not limited to club members alone.

There are special divisions for men's entries in flower arrangement. Reports from interested observers show that many Hermiston men are planning to show up the ladies when it comes to entering bouquets in their own division.
