We listened to President Roosevelt's radio talk a week ago Sunday, pleading that America face Europe's havoc with "national unity", not selfish partisanship and his solemn promise to use his utmost effort to keep the country neutral. Now that he has called a special session of congress for September 21, we will be able to determine how sincere he was in his statements.

One thing is certain, there will be a tense struggle over his proposal that the present embargo on arms shipments to Europe's belligerents be abolished. It will be a real test for a "he-man" president.

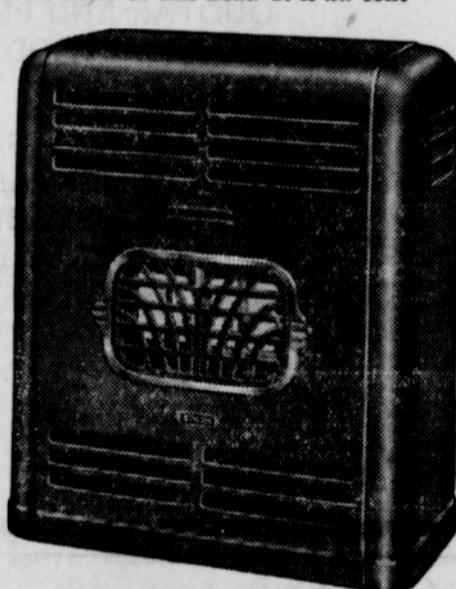
