SOCIAL SECURITY SETUP CHANGES

Congressional approval of amendments to the Social Security Act has caused the Social Security Board to stop accepting claims for lump-sum Old-Age Insurance benefits from wage earners now reaching 65, according to John F. Richardson, manager of the La Grande field office of the board, who was in Hermiston on Wednesday transacting board business.

Under the revised program, such workers have an opportunity to qualify for lifetime monthly benefits. These benefits will become payable on January 1, 1940, instead of January 1, 1942, as contemplated by the original law.

Termination of the payment of lump-sum benefits, up to now payable to workers at age 65, is the only revision of the old-age insurance program to take effect simultaneously when the amendments were signed by the president. The new and liberalized plan, while discontinuing this kind of benefit, enables all workers in covered employment, regardless of whether they reach 65 before or after 1940, to receive monthly benefits if they meet a few simple requirements.

"Workers who become 65 between now and 1940 and many of those who have already attained that age and been paid lump-sum benefits will, in almost all cases," Richardson said, "get considerably more from the revised old-age insurance

plan than they could have received before the law was amended. The monthly benefits now provided will practically always amount to much more than the lump-sum to which the claimant would formerly have been entitled."
