GARDEN CLUB CHATS

Members of the club who were present at the meeting on Monday heard a most interesting talk on the origin and culture of dahlias, given by J. H. Reid, well known on the project as an enthusiastic and successful grower of these plants. Information given by Mr. Reid was the result of the study of the growth of dahlias under local conditions, and was most helpful.

Cascade chrysanthemums have lately come into favor and would appear to be well worth trying. As the name would indicate, they grow downward, rather than erect, but may also be trained against the side of the house or a wall. They may also be used on a bank or as a ground cover. An article in the American Home says they may be started as other hardy chrysanthemums, from seed as soon as obtainable, from soft wood cuttings taken from the plants during the winter or from tip cuttings from fresh growth in spring and early summer. Illustrations in the article published in the September issue of the magazine are very beautiful, and careful cultural directions are given.

Owing to the almost torrid weather we have been having, the local gardener who goes out now to follow directions for fall transplanting, is apt to find that the subject to be worked upon is covered with late bloom, and a bright spot in the garden plot.
