## GARDEN CLUB CHATS

Salvia splendens, the scarlet sage, has been planted more than usual on the project this year and its rich red blooms have attracted much attention. It is of the mint family and will grow in almost any soil, but needs sun most of the day. It is hard to combine with other colors in the garden, and should stand alone in mass, or with carefully chosen colors of other blooms. There is a blue variety that is hardy in the garden for years.

Lily-of-the-valley is easily flowered in the home. A bowl six inches in diameter will hold ten or twelve pips. Planted in peat moss in an upright position, with the shoots extending above the bowl, and moistened with warm water, flowers will appear in three or four weeks, in usual room temperature.

A look at the book of registration for visitors at the flower show, shows names from Ohio, North Dakota, Cottage Grove, Los Angeles and Laurel, Montana. The visitor from the last named place was president of the Laurel Garden club, and we are sure that our flower show will get fine publicity.

Verbena will give continuous bloom from June to late fall, and its rich, varied colors are well suited to mass effects. It may be used to advantage among glads and other bulbs as a ground cover.

As you may suspect, we have been looking over the Garden Encyclopedia that has been purchased by the club and is maintained at the library. Apparently every question that one may wish to ask is answered in its pages, and not the least of its charms is that the correct pronunciation is plainly indicated. Habits of years will have to be changed from our sometimes Model T way in naming the flowers. We rejoice, however, to find that the experts have decided to emphasize the "O" instead of the "DI" in the lovely gladiola.

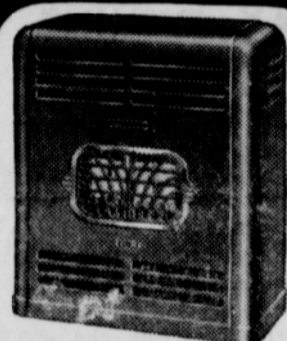

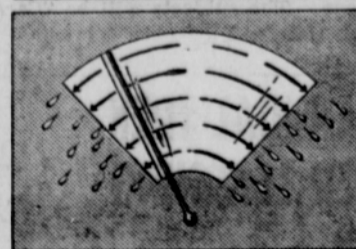
