autumn leaves will keep fresh indefinitely if glycerine is added to the water in the container. The proportion given was two parts water to one of glycerine. Commercial glycerine is much cheaper than the refined product and gives good results, imparting a lovely sheen to the leaves.

Try working coffee grounds into the soil around cactus plants. One cacti fancier pots her cactus in pure coffee grounds and says they thrive better than those planted in sand.

GARDEN CLUB CHATS

October should be a very busy month for the dirt gardener. This is the proper time to plant narcissi, madona lilies, tulips and other small bulbs. Bone meal is a good safe fertilizer to use. Bleeding-hearts and peonies may be divided in the Fall. Poppy and bachelor's button seedlings are hardy and the seed may be sown now. This is a favorable time of the year for reseeding bare spots in the lawn. It is wise to apply manure to the roots of hardy chrysanthemums when the buds begin to show color. This, together with disbudding, will increase the size of the blooms.
