GARDEN CLUB CHATS

When growing bulbs in water for winter blooming indoors, charcoal in

the size used for feeding hens has several advantages over other mediums, even soil in pots. It never gets foul, does not require frequent watering, does not obstruct the growing roots and is cheap and easily obtained. Either pottery, crockery or glass may be used. It is interesting to watch the root growth through the glass. The dish should be filled with charcoal to within an half inch of the top, and water poured in until the charcoal floats free from the bottom. After a short time more water should be added and the charcoal stirred until it becomes saturated. The bulbs should

be nested into the charcoal about half their depth and then the container stored in a dark place for about three weeks for rooting.

There is a splendid article in the October number of Better Homes and Gardens on growing Spring bulbs out of doors.

There are two main types of flower arrangements: the full lavish type heretofore called mass arrangements, but now frequently referred to as "buxom bouquets" and line compositions. Line arrangements came from the Japanese. We have adapted many of their principles, changed others, but out of it all has come a composition thoroughly American. The mass arrangements were shown at their best by the early Dutch painters. In an eastern Garden Club, recently, these two types of arrangements were discussed and the members voted on their popularity. The result of this vote was forty to twenty-one in favor of the line arrangements.

Now that we have had some light frosts, it will soon be time to begin gathering seeds for next Summer's plantings.

One garden enthusiast told us of a very successful cover crop used in the tulip bed. When the tulips have been planted and after the frosts have come, sow annual phlox seed. The seed will come up early in the Spring and will make a blaze of glory for the entire season.

FARMERS TO NAME AAA COMMITTEES FOR 1940 PROGRAM

Election of Oregon farmers who will serve on county and community committees in administering the 1940 AAA program will be held soon, according to announcement by N. C. Donaldson of Corvallis, state administrator.

Community elections, at which 868 community committeemen and alternates will be selected, will be held throughout the state on October 27. County conventions, attended by one delegate from each community, will be held shortly thereafter. Three county committeemen and one alternate will be elected at each county convention.

A total of 1005 Oregon farmers serve on community and county committees, taking part in administering the federal government's agricultural conservation program, Donaldson said. They represent approximately 42,000 Oregon farmers participating in the conservation program.

By balloting in community halls, courthouses, schoolhouses and other community meeting places, farmers have a direct voice in selecting the men who will be in charge of the AAA program in their county, Donaldson pointed out.
