GARDEN CLUB CHATS

October is the golden month of the year, with its red and gold colors, and it offers a golden opportunity to start a compost pit. The greatest sin a gardener can commit in the Fall is to burn the Autumn leaves. Leaf ashes are worthless, but the well rotted leaves mixed with our light soil in the Spring, are valuable indeed. See the Garden Encyclopaedia at the library for directions for making a compost heap or pit.

To promote happiness and good cheer, treat your family to a Winter Flower Show. Stage it in the sunniest window in your home, but rehearsals will have to take place in a cool, dark room. For your show choose your cast from crocus, tulips, hyacinths and narcissus. It is possible to book the engagement to run continuously from the first of December to Easter. You can enjoy an advanced showing of Spring in your living room, even while the weather is cold and bleak out doors. Use pots that are not too large, (they will bloom earlier if slightly root bound) ordinary garden soil, provide drainage, keep well watered and let remain in a cool dark place from three to six weeks, before bringing them into the light and heat. But don't wait too long! Book those bulbs now if you want blooming narcissus for Christmas.

Hair Coloring, Disposition Show Definite Relation

The frequently expressed theory that there is no greater difference between blonde, brunette and red-haired women than between three automobiles of the same model painted in different colors has been disproved by British scientists.

The three types, scientists declare, are as distinct from each other as three human races, and there is ample evidence that they have been distinct races before humanity became so thoroughly mixed up by emigration and intermarriage.

The striking differences between the three types of women include the fact that a blonde averages 150,000 separate hairs on her head, a brunette has between 80,000 and 130,000, and a redhead may have as few as 25,000 because red hair is coarser than blonde or brunette.

Blondes skins are not really white, nor are brunettes' skins really brown. They each contain large quantities of red, orange, yellow, green, blue indigo and violet. A blonde has more yellow in her skin than a brunette, a brunette has less green or green blue than a blonde and "redheads" have a more equal blending of all the colors.

A blonde really can turn green when the blood leaves her cheeks as a result of the sudden shock or nausea, because the extra green pigment in her skin then becomes more prominent, the scientists explained.

Blondes and redheads are susceptible to skin affections. A real brunette virtually is immune. Brunettes seldom suffer from infantile paralysis and disease of the nervous system. Blondes are martyrs to the common cold, influenza and disease of the lungs. Brunettes usually have the best teeth. Blondes and redheads are often victims of rheumatism and rheumatic fever.

There is also a great mental as well as a physical difference between the three types. Blondes give way to excesses or rage and grief. They are more likely to kill those who have thwarted them than the other types.

Scientist Develops New Skin Test for Cancer

Dr. Benjamin Gruskin, director of oncology (tumor and cancer research) and experimental pathology at Temple Medical school in Philadelphia, has developed a simple skin test for cancer.

Revelation of the new cancer test was made when Dr. Gruskin filed for patent rights, thereby acknowledging apparent success for his discovery.

The test, which was reported successful in 90 per cent of cases attempted, consists merely of injecting a specially prepared fluid under the epidermis, or outer skin. The fluid is processed from tissues of embryo of calves, sheep or pigs.

If a person is cancerous in some part of the body, the section of the skin where the fluid was injected will turn a telltale red, according to the test. The weal will then push out thin projections, or pseudopodia (false feet).

However, if the skin does not change color, and the pseudopodia do not appear, the person is not suffering a cancerous condition, the test showed.

Dr. Gruskin described his experiment in the Journal of Laboratory and Clinical Medicine.

He explained that cancer cells are akin to normal cells but never "grow up" and remain in an embryonic state which causes them to grow wildly instead of becoming useful tissue.

The whole body becomes sensitive to that type of cell, the article said, and so, if outside embryonic cell material is injected the skin reacts and produces pseudopodia.

A similar test can also be performed on the blood if the skin is unhealthy, according to the Temple scientist.

Snake Expert Discounts Many Popular Beliefs

Seven years of hunting snakes, during which he has caught as many as 100 a day, have taught Larry Kersten, of McGregor, Iowa, that most popular beliefs about rattlesnakes are fallacies.

One such notion blasted by Kersten is that the rattler's age can be told by the number of buttons on the rattle.

The truth is, according to the reptile hunter, that rattlers grow a button every time they shed their skins and that is two or three times a year.

Kersten just laughs at the belief that a rattler won't strike unless coiled.

"The fact is," he said, "the snake assumes the shape of a letter S, then straightens out when it strikes."

Early in the spring, Kersten takes to the hills with a gunny sack, heavy gloves and a pair of homemade tongs. He seizes a rattler just back of the head with the tongs, snips out the poisonous fangs while it thrashes madly about and maneuvers it into the sack.

He has collected as much as \$700 a year in snake bounties.

Largest Meteorite

Biggest meteorite ever dug out of the ground was found at Bacubirito in Mexico; it is a mass of iron weighing about 50 tons. In western Arizona, there is a mile-wide crater believed to have been dug by a giant meteor in prehistoric times. What was probably the earth's largest visitor was the prodigious Podkamennaya Tunguska body—possibly a small comet—which crashed into northern Siberia in 1908. It dented the earth with a crater several miles broad, killed 1,500 reindeer, dammed a river and seared forests for 100 miles around.

Monument to a Cook

In Villeneuve-Loubet, France, near Grasse, there is a monument to Auguste Escoffier, the great French chef and inventor of peach Melba. At Mount Saint Michel, France, there is the tomb of Mme. Poulard, famous as a maker of omelettes. She and her husband kept a tavern which was popular because of her skill as a cook. The inscription on the grave reads: "Here repose Victor and Annette Poulard, faithful spouses and good tavernkeepers. May the Lord welcome them as they received their guests."

Parking Problem Answer

Stepping forward with a solution to the ever troublesome parking problem recently was Miss Constance Kiehel, an economic analyst for the Social Security board at Washington. After extensive research Miss Kiehel has found that it's cheaper to park illegally in congested downtown areas and be fined than to pay for parking privileges. Although she has received four parking tickets in the last few months and 22 in the last few years, she cited that her system costs much less than \$1 a week.

When Ethel Barrymore was to play her first leading part in New York, John Drew sent her an apple. Throughout his lifetime he observed the custom on first nights.
