## STATE FARM BUREAU TO MEET NOV. 17 AT HOOD RIVER

Agricultural problems affecting the entire state will be discussed at the annual convention of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation to be held in Hood River, November 17 and 18. The opening day of the convention will be devoted to commodity group sessions in which farmers will gather according to the crops which they raise and talk over the principal problems facing them. From these meetings will come recommendations to be consolidated into a program for action by the Farm Bureau organization throughout the state.

In addition to the commodity group sessions, Farm Bureau members will hear and participate in discussion of transportation and taxation problems of Oregon. Trucking, rail and water transportation will be covered in that division and agricultural taxation problems will form the principle basis of discussion in that section.

President Mac Hoke, Pendleton, of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation, declares that indications are that members throughout the state will be present at the convention in addition to many other agricultural leaders. National Secretary R. W. Blackburn of Chicago will participate in the discussion and outline the program of the American Farm Bureau Federation.

Hoke points out that the Farm Bureau is a rapidly growing organization in Oregon and declared that the 1939 convention is expected to signal the beginning of the most outstanding year for the agricultural group in Oregon.

## STATE WITHDRAWS FIRE ORDINANCES

Revocation of Federal and State Fire Laws requiring camp fire permits, axe, shovel and water buckets, and prohibiting smoking while traveling in the forest has been announced by forest service officers.

Wet weather during the early part of the month has eliminated much of the fire danger which previously existed. However, hunters and forest users are requested to be careful with fires in the timber. It is always unlawful to build a fire in a dangerous place, or to leave any fire to burn unattended or failing to totally extinguish a fire before leaving.

Entry and no smoking closures which have existed on the Mount Emily Lumber company holdings and on the Kinzua Logging area have also been revoked by the Governor as has the Mill Creek Watershed closure.
