### ELK SEASON TO BEGIN SUNDAY

Sunday, October 29, marks the opening of the seventh consecutive season on elk in northeastern Oregon, since the season was first opened in 1933 after a long period of closure. The 1939 season will remain open to and including November 12, 1939.

The bag limit is one bull elk having horns; however, 500 special permits have also been issued to take adult cow elk in the same area and during the same period that the season is open for bull elk.

The open area includes Baker county, Morrow county, Grant county, that part of Wallowa county north of the baseline and west of the Innaha river, and all of Union and Umatilla counties except the Mt. Emily game reservation.

In accordance with provisions of the legislative act, hunters will be required to report at a checking station before entering the elk area and likewise check out upon leaving the area regardless of whether or not any elk was killed. Checking stations, which will be open by noon on Friday, October 27, will be located at the following places: Pendleton, Milton, Pilot Rock, Ukiah, La Grande, Baker, Enterprise, Heppner, Seneca, Long Creek, Dale, North Powder, Austin, Troy, Sumpter, Drewsey, Juntura, Starkey and John Day.

### GARDEN CLUB CHATS

There is still time to build a perennial border, if you start at once. It has been proven that Fall transplanting has advantages over Spring transplanting. The plants get settled, the roots take hold and there is a minimum of loss. In the Spring these Fall transplanted clumps start ahead rapidly. When it comes to choice of plants, each of us have our

favorites. That is a part of the fun of gardening! Be sure to make your plans so that there will be blooms all season long. Special favorites may be used in quantities to dominate the border different months of the growing season, such as Oriental poppy during May, shasta daisy in June, phlox during July and August, coreopsis in September, while the spicy hardy chrysanthemums will claim the spot light in October and November.

Now is one of the best times of the year to make changes in the garden. Cool weather has checked the growth of the plants and shrubs, and they may be transplanted now to take advantage of the first growth in the Spring. We suggest a few which may be safely planted: evergreens, lilacs, peonies, phlox and other perennials, and also shade trees.
