450 O.S.C. STUDENTS IN MUSIC GROUPS

Oregon State College—More than 10 per cent of the undergraduate students at O.S.C. this year are engaged in some organized musical activity, according to a report just made by Paul Petri, head of the department of music.

The largest organization this year is the Madrigal club, with 141 members, not counting a second chorus of this club with 41. The first and second bands have 115 students, the

orchestra 55, and the co-ed band, the only one of its kind on the Pacific coast, has 40 members. In addition to these, the Glee club is made up of 70 men singers, making a total of 450 students active in these musical organizations.
