AAA HEAD COMING TO WHEAT LEAGUE MEET CO CONDON

WASCO—R. M. "Spike", Evans administrator of the AAA, will attend the twelfth annual convention of the Eastern Oregon Wheat league at Condon December 8 and 9, according to definite assurance received by H. D. Proudfoot, president of the league.

While high officials of the United States department of agriculture have previously attended the wheat league meetings, including Harry Brown, assistant secretary, last year, this will be the first time that the AAA administrator has been present. Also on the program will be N. E. Dodd, director of the western division of the AAA, as well as specialists in production and economics from Oregon State college and elsewhere.

Adding to the national importance of this year's convention is the fact that at least a dozen wheat-growing states are sending delegates in connection with the national contest on wheat acreage compliance sponsored by the Eastern Oregon Wheat league this year. Results of this contest are now being compiled, after which national and state awards will be made at the convention.
