GARDEN CLUB CHATS

Paul de Graaff, bulb specialist of Dutch descent, who lives near Portland, is probably better qualified to speak on growing daffodils than any one in the northwest. In a recent

talk he stated that daffodils should be planted during the month of October, but that there was still time in this locality if they were put in the ground at once. He also said that the bulbs should be planted so that the top would be four inches from the top of the ground. If you plan to plant annuals over them for color later, they should be put in the ground about two inches deeper. Deep planting seems to produce larger flowers, while more shallow planting encourages rapid multiplication of bulbs with more but smaller flowers.

Lily-of-the-valley beds should be dug up and the dense matted roots separated and reset in individually three to four inches apart and about two inches deep, once every four or five years. Before planting the ground should be enriched with well rotted manure.

Now that the gladiolus corms have been dug and allowed to dry off, don't forget to store them in bags with naphthalene flakes to kill the eggs of the thrips.

If you have a metal or wire frog which rusts the bottom of your containers try cutting a piece of cellophane which is invisible and will not show.
