FSA LENDS FARMERS CASH FOR START

More than 4200 Oregon farm families have been aided by the Farm Security administration in becoming established on farms capable of producing them a living, according to a summary report of FSA activities given recently by Clifford Smith, state director of rural rehabilitation. Smith spoke to a conference of extension specialists at O. S. C.

Out of a total of \$4,334,857 loaned to people who had no other credit available, \$1,417,870 has already been repaid. Smith reported. About 500 loans have been paid in full while only 80, or about 2 per cent, have been written off as failures.

Loans under this arrangement are still being made, although there has been about 25 per cent less call this year than last, the state director said. He explained that only families that have no regular credit facilities are eligible for these rehabilitation loans, and then only when investigation shows a reasonable chance for them to succeed if "put on their feet."

When such a loan is made, a definite farm management plan, including a practical cropping system, is drawn up which follows the findings of the experiment station and extension service as well as the experience of successful farmers in the community. Repayment is planned on the basis of estimated income from following this sound farming program.

WHEN THE LUNCH BELL RINGS

The organized school lunch has gotten off to a better start this fall than at any time since young America began its annual tussle with the three R's.

One reason for this is the public consciousness that to develop the sound mind in the sound body, the citizen of tomorrow has to have good food and plenty of it, today and every day. Parents everywhere are showing interest in the health programs of the schools and watching the lunchrooms especially, knowing how much they do contribute to the health and welfare of their children. Mary Schwartz Rose, Columbia University nutritionist, even goes so far as to say: "The machinery of education is wasted if it operates on a mind listless from hunger or befogged by indigestible food, whether the cause be carelessness, poverty, or ignorance."

Though hungry children are seldom fussy about their food, the lunchroom manager is always on the lookout for new ideas. To her the daily bill-of-fare is much more than just a way to take care of that "empty feeling". She puts all of the "protective" foods possible into the menu—milk, eggs, fruits and vegetables, whole-grain cereals . . . combined in endless different ways.

One day it may be a thick steaming soup with sandwiches to help stick to the ribs. In fact a milk soup is an ideal sandwich accompaniment especially in the winter school months. It seems to top even the always popular hot chocolate. Then there are the ever popular all-in-one hot dishes, combining vegetables with meats, eggs, or fish, and some such cereal as rice, cracker wheat, or corn meal. To the youngsters it's just food; it looks good, smells good, and tastes good. But the lunchroom manager sees it in terms of long-time nutrition. She looks on each lunch as doing its daily bit toward a diet giving children at least some of the food values they must have in order to develop strong bodies and alert minds.

A trained dietitian may even figure the menu in terms of calcium, iron, phosphorus, vitamins, proteins, calories. But for general purposes it is enough to keep in mind the main food groups, putting emphasis always on the protective group. A simple pattern to keep in mind which follows the standards of nutritionists may look like this: Milk, plus vegetable or fruit, plus substantial food, equals a good lunch.

If the school lunch is run in this way it becomes an educational project for the whole community. For children are quick to carry home new ideas. And when parents understand the plan and purpose of the hot lunch at school, the family meals may also be selected with an eye to better nutrition.

4-H ANNIVERSARY TO BE OBSERVED

The 25th anniversary of the start of 4-H club work in Oregon under federal and state cooperative auspices will be the central theme of this year's annual agricultural and home economics workers' conference to be held at Oregon State college December 13 to 16.

At this conference all the field workers of the extension service and experiment station come to Corvallis for a conference with central staff research, teaching and extension personnel and there review the activities of the year and plan the program for the following year. Greater coordination of effort with resulting benefit to the state has resulted from these conferences.

MAJOR PROBLEMS TO BE DISCUSSED

CONDON—A fundamental discussion of current world affairs as related to agriculture will be featured on the program of the twelfth annual convention of the Eastern Oregon Wheat League, to be held here December 8 and 9, according to the program just issued by officers of the league.

While most of the program numbers are concerned with eastern Oregon problems, some are of a more general nature, such as the address by Holbrook Working of the food research institute at Stanford university, who will speak on "Influences Likely to be Most Influential in Determining the Course of Prices Generally During the Present War."

Committees will meet Thursday afternoon to draw up preliminary reports for final consideration in the regular meeting. R. M. Evans, administrator of the AAA, D. E. Stephens, now of Washington, D. C., and D. E. Richards of the Union branch experiment station are the first day's speakers, while N. E. Dodd, western AAA director, R. H. Elliott and Warren H. Marple of the Bonneville dam staff, and E. L. Potter of Oregon State college are second day headliners.
