BILL JACKSON MAKES COLLEGE WHO'S WHO

Bill Jackson, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Jackson of the Minnehaha district, who is a Junior at Pacific University, is among those students who will be listed in the 1939-40 issue of "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges."

This book will be released in January or February. It is the only means of national recognition for graduates which is devoid of politics, fees, and dues. Several students from accredited colleges are selected each year by an unprejudiced committee, for their biographies to appear in this publication.

These books are placed in the hands of hundreds of companies and others who annually recruit outstanding students for employment. The purpose of "Who's Who" is to serve as an incentive for students to get the most out of their college careers; as a means of compensation to students for what they have already done; as recommendation to the business world; and as a standard of measurement for students comparable to such agencies as Phi Beta Kappa and the Rhodes Scholarship award.

Mr. Jackson is a member of Alpha Zeta Fraternity at Pacific University, was vice president and president of his class in 1937 and 1938, was manager of the Pacific Index last year, has been active in debate and will with three other men represent Pacific at the debate tournament at Pasadena Junior college this fall, and was a member of the Publications Council last year. This year he is vice president of Alpha Zeta fraternity and of the Associated Students, and is a member of Blue Key and Tau Kappa Alpha, national honorary fraternities. Because of his outstanding work in journalism, Mr. Jackson was elected to Matrix, Pacific's Journalism Honorary, last year.

Mr. Jackson graduated from Hermiston Union high school in 1936, and during his high school career was active in debate, dramatics and student government, and a member of National Torch Honor society.

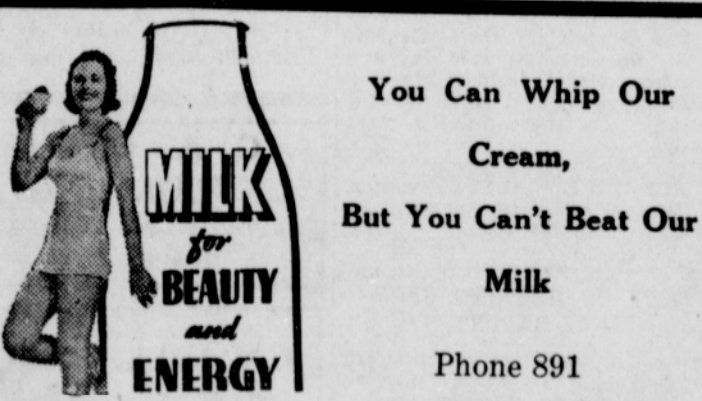

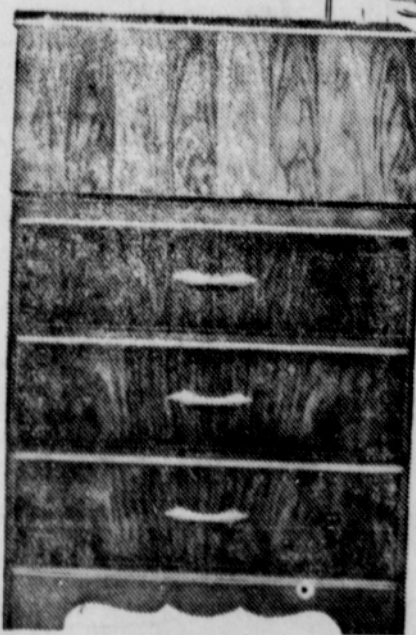
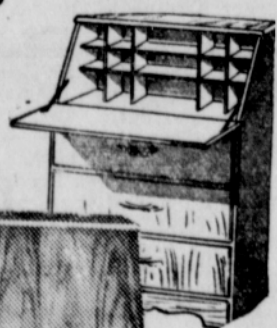
