**GARDEN CLUB CHATS**

Holly has long been associated with the yuletide season. There are many legends connected with it. One of the better known ones is that holly was used to make the crown of thorns at the crucifixion and at that time the white berries were turned to crimson drops of blood. There are about three hundred varieties of holly, most of which winter kill easily. Holly requires a semi-acid soil and much moisture. One variety, the Japanese oval leaf or Ilex crenata, is hardy in the most northern states. Another holly, commonly known as the Inkberry holly, which is very hardy even as far north as Nova Scotia, but this sort has berries which are a glistering black.

There seems to be some misunderstanding concerning the statement by the Christmas lighting committee to the effect that "no entry is eligible that is a duplication of that shown last year." By this statement the committee meant to convey that any materials on hand could be used but that the general effect must be changed or that new materials must be added to those used last Christmas. An exact duplication of the 1938 display will not be eligible for the contest.
