## NEW BEACON LIGHTS TO BE INSTALLED

The U. S. Bureau of Aeronautics has signed agreements with the Hermiston REA for installation of two new beacon lights along the lines of the local company. One beacon will be located some distance west of the Allen Thompson ranch while another will be set two miles east of Nolin on the top of a hill.

The beacon at Boardman will be moved to a new location 10 miles south of the town, according to reports. The series of lights will be along the The Dalles-Pendleton air route.
