CITY OF BOARDMAN, OREGON ORDINANCE NO. 21

An ordinance granting to Umatilla Electric Cooperative Association, a corporation, of Oregon, its successors and assigns, a franchise to construct and operate electric transmission, distribution and service lines in order to furnish electric energy to the City of Boardman, Oregon.

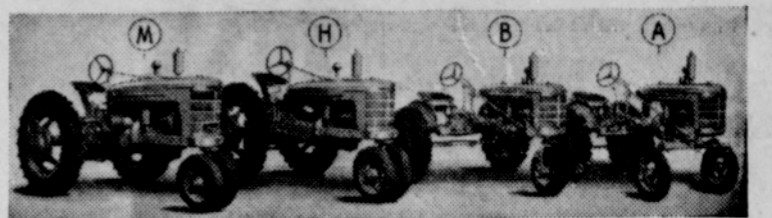
THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF BOARDMAN DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. That there is hereby granted to the Umatilla Electric Cooperative Association, hereinafter called the "Grantee", a corporation existing under the laws of the State of Oregon, its successors and assigns, the right, privilege or franchise, for a period of twenty (20) years from the date hereof, to construct, maintain and operate in the present and future streets, alleys and public places in the City of Boardman, Oregon, electric light and power lines, together with all the necessary or desirable appurtenances (including poles, towers, underground conduits, wires, transmission lines and telephone or telegraph lines for its own use), for the purpose of supplying electrical energy in said City.

Section 2. Poles and towers shall be so erected as to interfere as little as possible with traffic over said streets and alleys.

Section 3. All construction work
