GARDEN CLUB CHATS

With spring just around the corner, there are many things which can be done in the garden before the rush begins. Winter pruning of shrubs and roses should be completed by the end of this month.

There are many hardy annuals that can be seeded at this time. Shirley poppies, California poppies, bachelor's buttons, sweet alyssum, petunias, larkspur and calendulas are a few of the varieties that can be put in the soil now. Any annual which reseeds its self can be planted safely as early as the beds can be properly prepared for the seed. If

this is done, it will prove a boom to busy gardeners and housewives a little later when it seems as though the spring house cleaning and the spring planting must be done at the same time.

Cigar boxes make good seed pans or flats for starting seedling in the house. They are just the right size to fit close to the window where the light is best and are large enough to grow plenty of little plants for the small garden. Before filling them with soil make several small holes for drainage. It is a smart idea to bake the soil long enough to kill any pests that may be in it and then sift thoroughly to encourage root development.
