Word has been received of the death of R. C. Canfield, 85, on March 10 at his home in Modesto, Cal., from the effects of flu, which caused neuritis of the spine. He was born September 27, 1854, in Ohio and married Ellen Mahoney in 1882.

He left Ohio at the age of 26 and made his home at Colorado for eight years, working in the mines. The family then moved to Washington where he was a farmer and surveyor for 16 years. In 1904 the Canfields moved to Hermiston where they lived until 1928, when they moved to California.

He is survived by his widow, 1 daughter, Mrs. Ery. Gardiner, Caldwell, Idaho; two sons, John Canfield, Portersville, Cal., and Laurence Canfield, Modesto, Cal.; nine grandchildren, two of which live near Hermiston, and one great grandchild. Also surviving are one brother and one sister, living in Ohio.
