At the request of Mrs. B. A. Doyle, chairman of the flower show committee, we are planning on a series of flower show notes in preparation for the Spring Flower show which is to take place on April 27. Mrs. Doyle asks that all who intend to exhibit at this show make every effort to know the true name of the flower you are entering, its specie and variety. This is very important to know in order that your exhibit can be easily placed in the proper section and classification on the day of the show. With so many splendid seed catalogs with good descriptions and very often colored cuts of the different flowers and shrubs, we should be able to definitely identify each and every plant in our garden. When you begin to look for the true name and classification of your garden plants you will find it very interesting and also educational. This is one of the benefits derived from flower shows. Plants or blooms correctly named and marked stimulate the public's interest in gardening.

You will find a new up-to-the-minute Garden Encyclopedia at the library which will give you the correct name, description, genus, specie and variety of hundreds of plants and flowers if you have difficulty in finding it elsewhere. This Garden Encyclopedia can be taken out for three days. You will find it well worth while.

The success of a flower show depends greatly upon the exhibitor knowing the schedule for the show in which they intend exhibiting, knowing in which class their exhibits belong and knowing that each exhibit complies with the requirements for the classification in which it is to be exhibited. We have had two very splendid flower shows, but the coming show, our third, should be bigger, better and more correctly staged. Let each of us do our part to make it so.
