Mrs. Lois Kent purchased a Chevrolet coupe last week. She drove to Hood River for the week end.

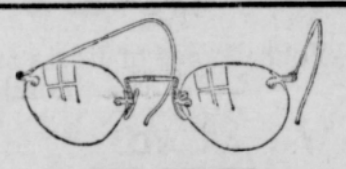
