GARDEN CLUB CHATS

This is the third in the series of flower show notes. Section J in the schedule for the spring show is for shadow boxes or picture boxes. To quote from the booklet published by the National Council of State Garden Clubs: "As used in flower shows, this term applies generally to a recessed space, with artificial lighting, in which is exhibited a floral composition, either with or without accessories. In this class the proportion of the arrangement and the accessories, if any, to the size of the space is of the greatest importance. No composition should be so small as to look lost in the space or so large that it touches the recess or fills it too much."

The scale of points by which this section will be judged are as follows:

Scale	30%
Size of arrangement, flowers and foliage, accessories and relation of all to space and each other.	40%
Design	40%
Line, mass, balance, emphasis, originality as well as relation of flowers to container and accessories.	20%
Color	20%
Condition	10%
Total	100%

The scale of points to be used in judging dish gardens in section L is as follows:

Arrangement	15%
Proportion	10%
Distinction and originality	15%
Proper combination of material	20%
Color combination	10%
Plants well established	20%
Condition	10%
Total	100%

At the last club meeting, March 22nd, three amendments were voted to the constitution and by-laws, the first to read as follows: Article 1, section 1: The Hermiston Garden Club shall meet on the second and fourth Fridays of each month unless otherwise voted by the club.
