Equal ranging. Placing flowers at equal heights.

Parallellism. When two adjacent stems or branches are exactly parallel to each other.

The highest point in an arrangement should be directly above the center of the base. This line may curve but should come back to this point directly above the center of the base. A flower arrangement must not look unstable.

The container is a part of the arrangement and must be related harmoniously to it in form, color, texture and size.

Simplicity is desirable, most arrangements are overcrowded.

These points are listed as the most important and with these in mind we should, if interested, be able to make good flower arrangements. The only thing required is practice.

It is better to mass colors than to spot them; that is, it is better to use our blue bachelor's buttons in a loose mass than to intermingle them a few in a place among the pink phlox.

Dark full-blown or heavy flowers do better at the base of an arrangement, with lighter ones, buds and smaller flowers as you go from the center.

The following practices are undesirable in arrangements: Cross cutting. Twigs crossing in the line of vision (branches intersecting one another) except where such growth is typical of the plant, as for example, the twigs and blossoms of the plum tree.

Flower Stepping. The regular spacing of flowers of quite uniform size one above another.

Sandwiching. Placing a flower of one color between two of another, or
