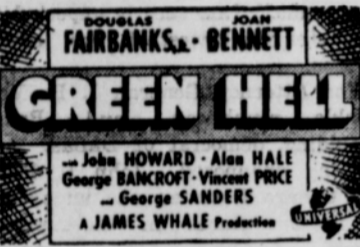

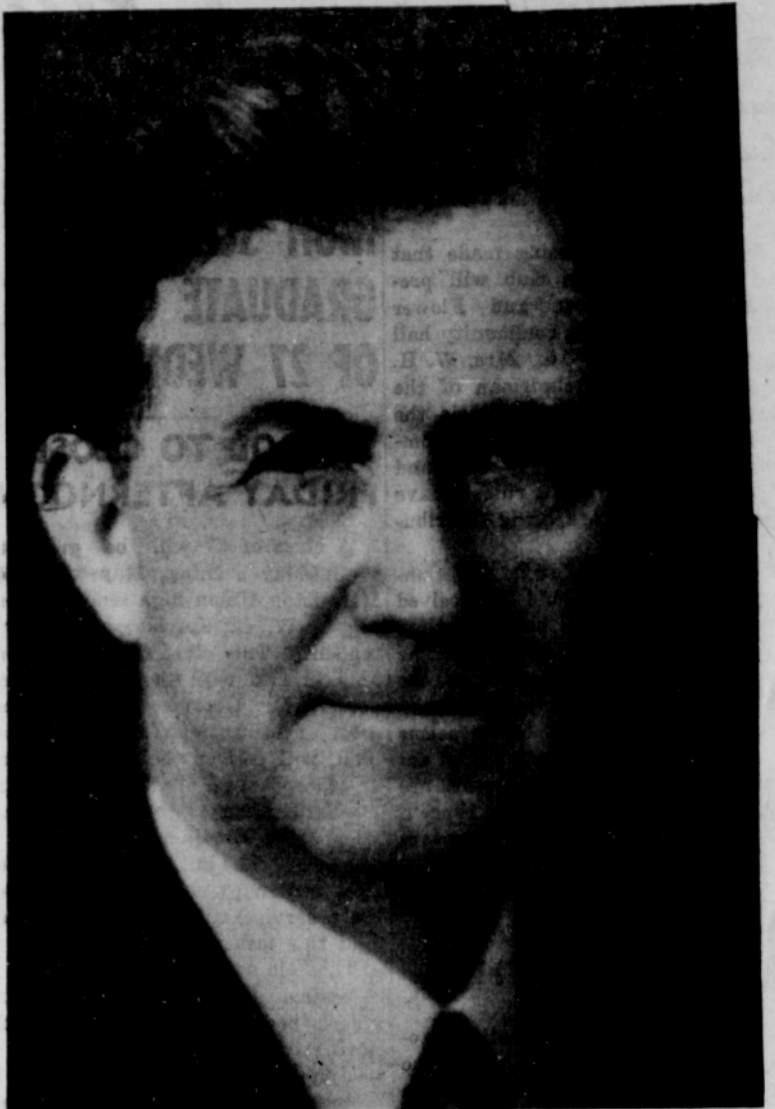

Oregon Voter Praises Dodd



The following was taken from the May 4 number of the Oregon Voter:

E. P. DODD, who served Umatilla county as representative in the 1919 legislature and declined to be a candidate for re-election; who entered the republican gubernatorial primaries in 1934 and withdrew rather than complicate the situation for such stalwarts as Rufus Holman and Frank Lonergan in a race won by the irrepressibly loquacious Joe Dunne; now surges as one of four candidates for two Umatilla republican nominations for the House. Dodd has the background of a lifetime of public activity in Eastern Oregon affairs; part of it as editor and owner of the old republican Pendleton Tribune; part as a leader for the establishment of irrigation projects; partly as head of organizations seeking Columbia River waterway improve-

ments. He knows Umatilla county as few others know it. Born October 13, 1873, in log cabin in Boise Valley and family went through Indian uprisings, Bannock war; college grad (Stanford 1 yr, Indiana 3 years); community builder of Hermiston region; so often president of Commercial Club, member of city council, member of school board, member of library board that we have lost count; engaged in livestock and irrigation farming; his career tied in with the fate of the irrigation projects of the Umatilla Valley; of recent years in real estate and insurance. An active citizen who has experienced much and who is qualified to establish legislative influence again as he did some twenty years ago. Shakespeare say: "If I had served myself as I served my community, there would be less gray in hair and more money in bank."
