"When the United States was plunged into the World War in 1917, the town of Hermiston responded to the nation's call in a spirit of exalted patriotism. The citizens of the town offered their efforts and means in the nation's defense, serving and sacrificing in the national cause. The town of Hermiston holds in proud memory its part in the great national effort which brought victorious peace in 1918."

"Many of the town's young men were called into the armed services and some of them were called upon to sacrifice their lives in that service, dying with thousands of other brave young Americans upon the battle fields of France. There, over their graves, a little flower sprang up and bloomed, nature's tribute to the heroic dead. It was the poppy, and their comrades ask America to wear a poppy in their memory, one day of each year. On the days of Friday and Saturday, May 24 and 25, the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary will distribute these poppies in our city."

ANNUAL LEGION POPPY DAYS TO BE FRIDAY-SATURDAY

Friday and Saturday, May 24 and 25, have been declared official poppy days in Oregon, according to reports from the Legion Auxiliary. Poppies will be on sale on the streets of Hermiston on both days with the Owl Patrol, Boy Scouts, and the Junior Auxiliary assisting. The event is an annual affair with the proceeds going to the disabled war veterans.

An interesting window has been arranged at The Herald office by Bill Belt, depicting Flanders' field with its white crosses and appropriate wording. Red poppies are scattered about the field of dark background. Bill Belt 'so won the poppy poster contest in high school, and Buddy Greeley was the winner in the grade school.

"We feel that Poppy Day will have increased meaning to America this year," said Mrs. R. H. Piersol, president of the local unit of the American Legion Auxiliary, "because renewed warfare in Europe has renewed the memory of those boys of ours who gave their lives 'over there' twenty-two years ago. It is for them that we put on the poppy each year, to show that we still remember and honor their sacrifices. It is the flower which grew where they fell and which now blooms on the coats of Americans who appreciate their service."

"Events of the past year have shown us clearly that to be secure the United States must have men ready and able to defend the country, willing to give their lives in its defense, if necessary. We can be thankful today that we had such men 22 years ago. From them we can draw inspiration for the patriotic service necessary to maintain our freedom and democracy against today's dangers. Wearing their flower over our hearts means that within our hearts their love of America still lives."

E. P. DODD LOSES BY THREE VOTES IN LEGISLATIVE RACE

EXTREMELY LIGHT VOTE CAST HERE

The final count in the legislative race between O. L. Babcock and E. P. Dodd shows that the local candidate lost by three votes. Unofficial count the day after the election showed Babcock in the lead by eight votes but this was cut down to three in the official count early in the week. Dodd has sent his congratulations to Babcock and Engdahl, the successful candidates, the latter winning by a large majority. Engdahl polled 2031 votes; Babcock, 1236; Dodd, 1233, and Grant, 633.

Dodd received 62 per cent of the highest vote cast in the east end of the county in the four cornered race and broke nearly even in Pendleton. In the west end where he received his largest majority, an extremely light vote was cast. He also won the democratic write-in nomination but will be unable to accept it, being four votes short of election on the republican ticket.
