GARDEN CLUB CHATS

Since I am enjoying a short vacation in Portland, I am going to send a few notes which I took at a lecture by Mrs. C. W. Strong of Portland last Saturday on the subject of "Flower Arrangement," for the Garden Club Chats this week.

Flower arrangements, Mrs. Strong says, should be tasteful, restful, and home like, and should strike a happy medium between the exotic, almost queer arrangements often found in flower shows, and flowers stuck in any old vase or fruit jar.

There is timely material appropriate for each month of the year. Never allow your flowers or foliage to become stale and old; replace or remove.

Containers that are simple in outline and soft in colors, are most complimentary to use. Ornamentation on a vase is apt to detract from the flowers and they, not the container, should be the focus of attention. Suit containers to the flowers and the surroundings of the arrangements.

Mrs. Strong feels that the usual principles of flower arrangement need not be followed slavishly, but that the natural lines of the material used should be taken into consideration. In fact, she thinks that "a woman should be allowed to be herself, either while arranging flowers, or buying a hat."

There is still time to start new clumps of chrysanthemums by planting the clippings from the tops of the old plants. Violet clumps should be divided now or the flowers will get smaller and the growth run to leaves.

Next meeting, May 24, and a color film on flower arrangement, will be shown by a representative of the Coca Cola company. To this meeting, members of the Umatilla, Stanfield and Echo clubs have been invited.
