GARDEN CLUB CHATS

To own a bit of ground, to scratch it with a hoe, to plant seeds and watch their renewal of life—that is commonest delight of the race, the most satisfactory thing a man can do.—Charles Dudley Warner.

Have you ever thought of keeping a garden record? A record of the date of blooming and the length of the blooming period of your flowers and shrubs will be both interesting and useful in the garden seasons to come. A record of combinations of flowers or shrubs which bloom at the same time and make a beautiful garden picture together will help others to plant with that idea in mind.

A neighbor has yucca and scarlet poppies blooming together and the effect is beautiful. It is worth copying.

The rose season may be prolonged by disbudding. Roses are apt to come in crops if we let nature take its course, but by removing about half the buds, some of the smallest and a few of a little larger size and leaving the terminal buds, the season can be prolonged.

The shoots pinched off entirely will start putting out new side growth which will bloom in a short time. By repeating this process there will be some roses in the garden at all times.

Seeds of perennials and biennials may be planted now and they will bloom next year. Delphinium seed will germinate much better if planted when they are fresh and this year's seed will soon be on the market. The Pacific hybrids are a vast improvement over the old varieties. We saw one recently with flowerrets the size of a dollar in a frosty blue color that was breath taking in its beauty.
