SWIMMING POOL NEED IS STRESSED

Certainly none of us would want to be in the position of either of the individuals in the following story. It seems a tramp was walking over a bridge in a desolated section of the south when he heard the cries of Help! Help! coming from the river. Looking down he saw a man struggling in the water. This unfortunate spied the tramp and hollered "Help! Help! I can't swim, I can't swim." The tramp gave another casual glance and continued his travels with the sarcastic reply, "Well, it looks to me as if this is a fine time to brag about it!"

For the protection of health and life and for the protection of happiness and content, every community should have a swimming pool. Swimming is the most healthful of exercises, and is one that offsets the evils of sedentary life. It encourages health and dispels disease; a swimming pool is truly one of the most valuable assets to a community.

Even though swimming is highly beneficial to us, it is also dangerous to many. Recently the Tri-State Anti-Pollution Commission representing New York, New Jersey and Connecticut declared: "We are living in the midst of a sewer, and the rivers are nothing but open cesspools." Over the entire nation rivers have been closed to swimming because the water has been found unfit for such purposes.

Paul H. Heudepohl, manager of the famous Jantzen Swimming association and a recognized authority on swimming and sanitation states, "Any water unfit for drinking purposes is unfit for bathing and swimming." All the water in the entire 400 miles of the Columbia river was found to be class "C", which means unfit for drinking purposes. Recently a test was made of local water used for swimming and it, too, was found to be in class "C". The state board of health maintains standards of sanitation that must be observed by all pool managements and water in modern swimming pools must be safe enough for drinking as well as swimming.
